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Tea Market Report: Sale 22 of 30th - 31st May, 2022

There was improved general demand at irregular levels for the 208,866 packages (13.70m/kgs) on offer with 27.81% remaining unsold.

Leaf Grades (M2)

Offerings: 116,740 packages (7.62m/kgs) – 36.05% unsold.

<u>BP1:</u>

Best – Saw increased interest gaining USC10 with selected lines advancing substantially by USC150.

Brighter – Firm to USC6 above previous rates to easier by USC2.

Mediums – KTDA mediums were firm but selected lines gained up to USC11 with plantation mediums USC3 to USC15 above last levels.

Lower Mediums – Strong but irregular interest ranging between firm to USC11 dearer to easier by USC2.

Plainer – Steady to USC12 dearer but a few lines lost up to USC5.

<u>PF1:</u>

Best – Met strong support gaining up to USC13.

Brighter – Saw increased enquiry advancing by USC10 to USC14.

Mediums – KTDA mediums were steady with more but irregular absorption for the plantation mediums at firm to USC13 dearer to easier **Current and Future Fresh Auction Offerings**

Plainer – Irregular interest ranging between steady to USC10 dearer to easier by USC6.

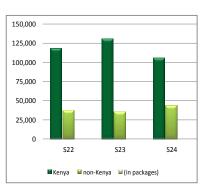

Best – Irregular interest and ranged between firm to USC3 dearer to easier by USC8. **Brighter** – Steady to USC8

above previous rates.



Mediums – KTDA mediums met irregular enquiry and ranged between firm to USC4 dearer but some lines shed up to USC22; plantation mediums were steady with some lines advancing by USC5 while others eased by a similar margin.

Lower Medium – Saw steady but irregular support varying between firm to USC6 dearer to easier by USC4.

Plainer – Strong enquiry at steady rates with selected better liquoring categories USC3 to USC10 dearer but a few Invoices lost up to USC4.

DUST1:

Best – Generally held value with a few lines USC10 dearer.

Brighter – Met strong interest at steady levels with a few invoices appreciating by up to USC6.

Mediums – KTDA mediums were irregular ranging between firm to USC4 dearer to easier by a similar margin with some lines discounted by up to USC22; plantation mediums saw strong absorption gaining

USC15 to easier by up to USC8. **Lower Medium** – Saw irregular enquiry ranging between firm to USC11 dearer to easier by up to USC7.

Plainer – Strong support at steady to USC8 dearer to easier by a similar margin.

Secondary Grades (S1)

Offerings: 30,746 packages (1.53m/kgs) – 31.73% unsold In the Secondary Catalogues, **BPs** were firm while best gained with **PFs** dearer. Clean well sorted coloury **Fannings** tended easier while best were steady with **similar DUSTs** appreciating. **Other Fannings** shed value with **DUSTs** firm. **BMFs** were readily absorbed.

<u>Market</u>

Egyptian Packers showed strong activity with more support from Pakistan Packers. Afghanistan and Bazaar lent increased and strong participation with Yemen, other Middle Eastern countries, Kazakhstan and other CIS states active. UK and Sudan showed selective enquiry. Russia were quiet with Iran subdued. Local Packers maintained participation on account of price while Somalia were active at the lower end of the market.

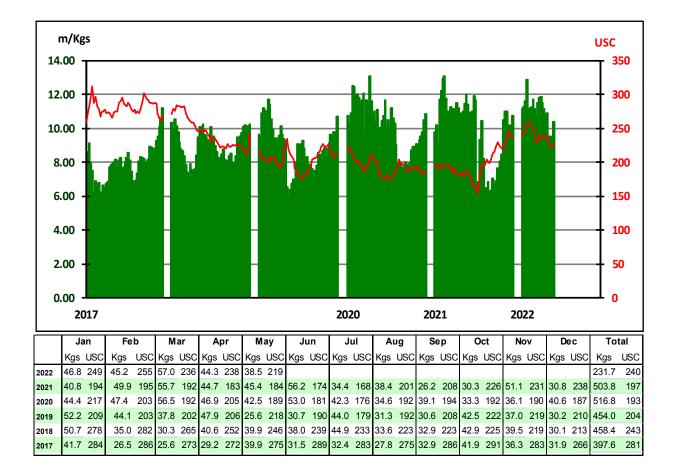

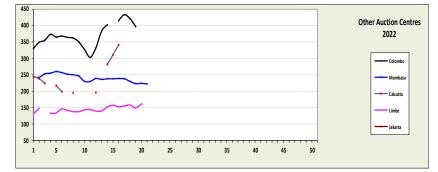
• olombo: at Sale 20 held on the 24th and C 25th May, 2022. The 0.94Mkg of Ex-Estate teas on offer met with lower demand. Select best Western High Grown BOPs were firm to a little easier at times, the below best and plainer varieties declined from last week's levels. Select best Western High Grown BOPFs were substantially lower, the below best and plainer varieties too declined with a number of invoices remaining unsold. Nuw ara Eliya BOPs were irregular, the BOPFs were firm. Udapusellaw a BOPs were barely steady, however the BOPFs declined following quality. Uva BOPs were firm to irregularly dearer at times, the BOPF declined from last week's levels following quality. Low Grown CTC BP1s declined substantially, the High and Medium sorts too were irregularly lower. The Low Grown PF1s were mostly firm, the High and Medium sorts declined irregularly from last week's levels. The 2.6Mkg of Low Grown teas which were on offer sold at lower levels. In the Leafy segment, OP verities were lower. OPAs followed a similar trend. Better OP1s were firm, others met with low er demand. In the Semi Leafy segment. BOP1s met with improved demand. Pekoe varieties were lower. Pekoe1s too sold at reduced levels to last. In the Small Leaf segment, well-made FBOPs were firm, others met with lower demand, FBOPF varieties attracted fair interest. Better FBOPF1s were firm, others declined several rupees. BOPF.SP, BOPF and BOP.SP met with reasonable demand whilst BOPs were lower. Premium Flowery teas met with improved demand. Russia, Iran and the C.I.S countries lent fair support whilst Turkey was selective. Libya and Iraq were selective.

Kenya is KTDA IN DIVERSIFICATION PUSH TO the first country in African region to join TMC. In a press statement sent to newsrooms signed by both the acting CEO TBK Peris Mudida and Chairman of the tea body Ramaz Chanturiya noted that, joining the TMC was an important strategy to promote the tea profession, trade, consumption, and collaboration with relevant stakeholders both nationally and globally. "It is indeed significant that TMC and TBK have chosen to announce this partnership and launch of the competition during the International Tea Day Celebrations on 23, May, 2022 held in Kericho. It is an important milestone as TMC Kenya competitions will bring together thousands of experienced, creative, professional and passionate tea makers of different tea cultures into a single authentic international competition system. The country looks forward to showcase her finest premium teas and finest tea masters and look forward to TMC supporting Kenya adopt innovative approaches to global tea collaboration, enhanced tea quality and trade." noted Ms Mudida and Mr. Chanturiya said. TMC has been in existence since 2013 and it involves people who are engaged in tasting, preparing and serving tea and tea drinks by both professionals and amateurs in four different categories notably tea preparation, tea pairing, tea mixology and tea tasting. Over the last 10 years, TBK has organized the Tea Recipe Competition to create awareness and boost consumption of tea locally with a progressive increase of consumption of tea by locals witnessed from 2011 to 2021. "Tea Recipe Competition attracted Kenyans from all walks of life and resulted in a boost of local tea consumption from 20.09mn/kilograms in 2011 to 38.4mn/kilograms in 2021," revealed Ms Mudida and Mr. Chanturiya. Countries that have hosted the Tea Masters International competition in the past include Turkey, South Korea, China and Vietnam. Currently 26 countries are registered to hold

national TMC competitions, where the national competition is held annually followed by a series of qualifying championships in the participating countries. CUSHION FARMERS

The Kenva Tea Development Agency (KTDA) is implementing a number of diversification activities with its farmers with a view to mitigating the revenue losses arising from climate change. The Agency's General Manager for Sustainable Agriculture Salesio Kaberia said besides encouraging farmers to move from the usual cutting, tearing, and curling (CTC) tea to higher-value specialty teas, the agency was also introducing other farming activities to boost their farmers' incomes. He said the agency was working to have the farmers grow Hass avocados for export while at the same promoting dairy production as a supplementary income stream. Kaberia spoke in Embu on Wednesday where they witnessed the launch of the Mt Kenya Sustainable Landscape and Livelihoods Project that will see 50000 tea and coffee farmers in Embu trained on climate-smart agriculture practices that will also lead to conservation of water and biodiversity conservation in the Mt Kenya water tower. KTDA is one of the organizations working with the Rainforests Alliance and county governments in the project areas to help in the attainment of the project's objectives. Kaberia said KTDA's factories have already achieved a 20 per cent reduction in the amount of wood fuel they consumed after introducing co-firing, a process that introduces alternative biomass fuels into their boilers other than the wood they have always used. He said tea earnings had been on a downward trend due to climate change, and especially reduced and erratic rainfall, and said the agency was helping farmers to introduce more resilient, higher yielding tea clones in place of the older varieties. He added that they were also looking at how to attract more youths into the tea business

Unprecedented 4th consecutive poor rainfall season for the Horn of Africa

Across the Horn of Africa, the 2022 March to May (MAM) seasonal rains were late, poorly distributed, and generally below average. Seasonal rainfall totals from the beginning of March to May 15th range from less than 50 percent of average to less than 75 percent of average in most areas, and drought conditions are severe and widespread

· Severe rainfall deficits affected main season Gu crops in Somalia, Belg producing regions in central, east, and southern Ethiopia, main season Long Rains crops over marginal agricultural producing areas of north, east, southeast, and coastal Kenva as well as in central Kenva.

 Little to no crop recovery is expected in affected areas of eastern East Africa as the peak of MAM season rains (late April to early May) has passed, late season rains have been highly localized, and drier-thanaverage conditions are forecast to continue

 This is now the fourth consecutive season of below-average rainfall for eastern East Africa overall, and many areas in Somalia, Ethiopia, and Kenya have been repeatedly impacted. NDVI data indicate severe vegetation stress in many areas due to multiyear and MAM 2022 drought conditions. March to mid-May 2022 rainfall is among the worst in the 40-year record across parts of Ethiopia, Somalia, Kenya, and Uganda.

 A fourth below-average MAM season is highly concerning and is very likely to worsen an already alarming food security situation in affected regions. Some of these areas are also at risk of below-average June to September 2022 rainfall that is expected to erode gains made by any received rains, followed by below-average October to November (OND) 2022 rainfall that has the potential to result in a fifth consecutive below-average season.

Regional Weather Conditions and World Crop

Kenya: Muranga: there was 12 mm of rainfall recorded over 3 wet days of the week. The highest and lowest temperatures were 27°c & 10°c respectively. Crop intake averaged 101.3 tonnes/day on a six day plucking cycle. Weather conditions were sunny during the day with showers at night.

Nyeri: this week was relatively sunny with 15.3 mm of rainfall received during the course of the week. The highest and lowest temperatures were 22°c & 13°c respectively. Crop intake averaged **582** tonnes/day on a six day plucking cycle.

Meru: The week was generally warm and sunny. There was **no** rainfall recorded through the week. The highest and lowest temperatures were **28°c & 18°c** respectively. Crop intake averaged **67.7** tonnes/day on a **six** day plucking cycle.

Sotik: The week continued to experience cloudy and cool conditions accompanied by showers throughout the week. The area received 29.6mm of rainfall spread in six wet days. The highest and lowest temperatures were 26°c & 14°c respectively. Factory utilization remained at week's levels.

Kericho: The week had partly sunny intervals in the mornings followed by cloudy and rainy afternoons. Average rainfall of 39.7mm was recorded. Average temperatures were highs of 22° Celsius and lows of 10° Celsius. Crop intake went up by 2% compared to

U ganda: There was increased rainfall activity experienced this week in some tea growing areas. Fort Portal received 102mm (67 mm) of rainfall while Hoima regions received 118mm of (85 mm) rainfall.

There was reduced rainfall in Kibale region 4mm(62mm) while Bushenyi region increased to 64mm (1mm). Average temperatures were highs of 29° Celsius and lows of 16° Celsius. Crop levels slightly improved.
