Offerings: 75,200 packages (4.88m/kgs). 20.72% were unsold.

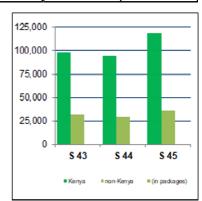
The Best BP1s available advanced by up to USC12 closely following quality but a few lines shed up to USC2 and a few invoices were unsold with Brighter varieties about steady to USC24 below last week's levels and some lines remained unsold. Medium types were discounted by USC5 - USC21 and many lines remained without bids but a few improved invoices were firm to USC2 dearer. Lower Medium categories were a weak feature easing by USC4 - USC68 and some invoices were unsold but a few improved lines were marginally dearer while Plainer descriptions met an irregular interest ranging between USC2 - USC4 above previous prices to easier by USC2 -

Lower Medium sorts saw an irregular interest and varied between USC2 - USC14 above previous week's levels to easier by USC6 - USC27 and some lines were unsold with Plainer types irregular ranging between steady to USC34 dearer to easier by USC3 -USC21 some teas were neglected.

The Best **DUST1s** on offer were irregular with quality ranging between firm to USC4 dearer to eastypes steady on last rates while absorbed. medium sorts met an irregular enquiry varying between firm to USC2 dearer to easier by USC10 -USC29 and a few invoices remained unsold. Lower Medium categories were steady to USC26 below previous week's rates while Plainer descriptions were irregular and held firm to USC5 above last prices to easier by USC2 - USC11 easier and many invoices were neglected.

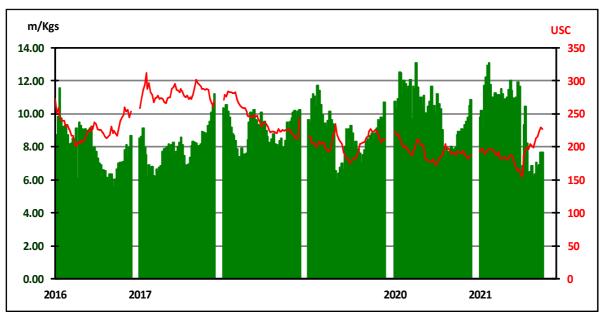

Other Tea Auction Centres

Jakarta: at Sale 42 held on the 19th October 2021. 9,700 psacks were offered for sale today including 1,960 psacks CTC teas. There was good general demand at overall firm to dearer levels. The lower end of the market saw keen activity, pushing the prices by upto 5 usc higher.

Colombo: at Sale 41 held on 18th October, 2021, The 0.6 Mkg of Ex Estate teas on offer met with irregular demand. Select best BOPs were selectively dearer following special inquiry, the below best and plainer varieties were irregular. Select best BOPFs were irregularly lower at times, the coloury invoices in the below best category were dearer, whilst the others were firm to easier. Nuw ara Eliya BOPs sold fairly well, however the BOPFs mostly remained unsold. Udapusselllaw BOPs were irregular, the BOPFs were tending a little lower. Uva BOPs were firm to a little easier at times, the BOPFs were mostly easier. Low Grown CTC BP1s were firm on last levels, the High and Medium sorts were firm. Low Grown PF1s were tending a little easier, the High and Medium sorts were firm on last levels. The 1.9Mkg of Low Grown teas which were on offer met with irregular demand. Select best OP1s were firm, best and below best varieties declined a few Rupees. BOP1s met with low er demand. Select best OPA were firm, best and below best types shed few rupees, others were lower. OPs followed a similar trend. Well-made Bold Pekoes were firm, mixed varieties shed few rupees. Pekoe1s were lower to last. In the Small Leaf segment, select best BOP.SP/BOPF.SP and BOPFs were dearer. Select best BOPs gained following quality. Select best FBOPs were dearer, others were irregularly low er. Select best and best FBOPF1s gained a few rupees, below best varieties were firm. FBOPFs were firm. All Premium Flowery teas met with good demand. 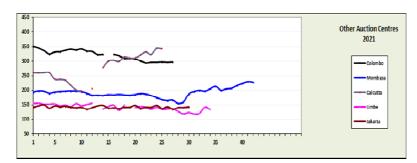

Sri Lanka reverses organic farming drive as tea suffers

Government backs down from ambitious plans to become the world's first completely organic farming nation, reversing ban on fertiliser imports.

Sri Lanka has backed down from its ambitious plans to become the world's first completely organic farming nation, reversing a ban on imports of chemical fertiliser. President Gotabaya Rajapaksa imposed a total ban on agrochemicals in May, saying he wanted to make Sri Lankan farming 100 percent organic. Plantations Minister Ramesh Pathirana on Tuesday said the change was to help growers of Ceylon tea, exports of which are worth \$1.3bn annually for the island nation. "Considering the fact that there has been a quality drop in tea that was produced in factories, the government has taken the decision to import sulphate of ammonia,' Pathirana told reporters in Colombo. He said imports of chemical fertiliser would continue until the island was able to produce enough organic fertiliser for local agricultural needs. Rajapaksa's policy had sparked anger among tea plantation owners and other farmers who warned that a lack of organic fertiliser and lower yields would lead to shortages. This risked compounding problems for a government already facing an unprecedented shortage of foreign exchange to import fuel, food and medicines. Last week, the government breached its own ban by importing from Lithuania 30,000 tonnes of potassium chloride, but called it "organic fertiliser". "We are not a stubborn government," government spokesman Dullas Alahapperuma told reporters at the same

briefing with Pathirana. "We are sensitive to the needs of the people."

Wednesday, 20 October 2021 Green tea catechins promote oxidative stress

Green tea has long been known to have health benefits. In particular, it contains catechins called ECG and EGCG that are said to prolong life. These two substances belong to the group of polyphenols. They are considered antioxidants. which means they counteract or prevent oxidative stress in the body caused by aggressive free radicals of oxygen. Until now, research has assumed that the catechins neutralise these free radicals and thus prevent damage to cells or DNA. One source of oxygen free radicals is metabolism; for example, when the mitochondria - the powerhouses of the cell - are working to produce energy. ETH researchers led by Michael Ristow, Professor of Energy Metabolism at the Department of Health Sciences and Technology at ETH Zurich, together with colleagues from the University of Jena, have now taken a closer look at how catechins act in the nematode worm C. elegans. And they have come to a different, seemingly paradoxical conclusion: rather than suppressing oxidative stress, the catechins in green tea promote it. In a study just published in the journal Ageing, Ristow's team shows that these polyphenols from green tea initially increase oxidative stress in the short term, but that this has the subsequent effect of increasing the defensive capabilities of the cells and the organism. As a result, the catechins in green tea led to longer life and greater fitness in nematodes that were fed to them. "That means green tea polyphenols, or catechins, aren't in fact antioxidants, but rather pro-oxidants that improve the organism's ability to defend itself, similar to a vaccination," explains study leader Ristow. However, this increase in defensive capability manifests not through the immune system, but rather by activating genes that produce certain enzymes such as superoxide dismutase (SOD) and catalase (CTL). It is these enzymes that inactivate the free radicals in the



nematode; they are essentially endogenous antioxidants. Ristow isn't surprised to see this kind of mechanism at work. His research group showed back in 2009 that the reason sport promotes health is because sporting activities increase oxidative stress in the short term, thus improving the body's defences. Consuming fewer calories has the same effect, as has been shown several times in animals. Mice fed a reduced-calorie diet live longer than those fed a normal, highcalorie diet. "So it made sense to me that the catechins in green tea would work in a similar way," Ristow explains. He goes on to say that the findings from this study translate well to humans. The basic biochemical processes by which organisms neutralise oxygen free radicals are conserved in evolutionary history and are present in everything from unicellular yeast to humans. Ristow himself drinks green tea every day, a practice he recommends. But he advises against taking green tea extracts or concentrates. "At a certain concentration, it becomes toxic," he says. High-dose catechins inhibit mitochondria to such an extent that cell death ensues, which can be particularly dangerous in the liver. Anyone consuming these polyphenols in excessive doses risks damaging their organs. While the most catechins are to be found in Japanese varieties of green tea, other green teas also contain sufficient amounts of these polyphenols. Black tea, on the other hand, contains a much lower level of catechins, since these are largely destroyed by the fermentation process. 'That's why green tea is preferable to black tea," Ristow says

Regional Weather Conditions and World Crop

Renya: Murang'a: There w as 79mm of rainfall recorded in 4 w et days of the week. The highest and low est temperatures were 28°c & 10°c respectively. Crop intake averaged 11 thonnes /day on a 6 day plucking cycle. The weather condition was rainy and sunny.

Sotik: The week was cold and cloudy accompanied with some showers. We received 29.4mm of rainfall spread in five wet days. The highest and lowest temperatures were 26°c & 12°c respectively. Factory utilization was slightly higher than last week's levels.

Kericho: The week under review was generally supply
